Welcome from the Chairman & President

Friends and Colleagues:

2025 was a monumental year for the Florida Network of Youth and Family Services. We successfully bid for and secured a competitive 5-year contract with the Florida Department of Juvenile Justice (DJJ) ensuring we can continue to provide our services to Florida's children and families for the next 10 years. We also worked to modernize and strengthen our governing statute to better align our services with the evolving needs of the state.

The ringing endorsement from our state partners has reinvigorated our team and reignited the mission that drives our work each day. As we start the new year, we are inspired by a Florida sunrise: symbolizing new beginnings for our organization and for the families we serve.

In addition to securing our long-term contract, 2025 brought exciting opportunities for growth and innovation.

We entered a new agreement with DJJ to expand one of our hallmark programs, SNAP® (Stop Now and Plan), to youth on probation, and secured additional funding to develop a standalone Physically Secure program for adjudicated children in need of services. We partnered with the Florida Department of Children and Families' (DCF) Step Into Success Program to offer a 12-month internship to an individual with lived experience in foster care, expanded and strengthened programming and training statewide, and developed new reports to more effectively demonstrate program activity and impact.

We also addressed growing concerns around contraband in shelter programs through a joint leadership task force with the Florida Juvenile Justice Association and DJJ. In a major milestone, we secured a patent for the NIRVANA technology and completed a validation study, providing science-based evidence of the powerful impact this tool has on Florida families.

Additionally, we welcomed two highly accomplished professionals to our Board of Directors, expanded our internal team with five new hires and one promotion, and aligned our work through the Working Genius team management model. I'm incredibly proud of the significant growth of our team and expansion of our capabilities.

As we look to 2026, the organization will focus on strengthening processes, communication and advocacy efforts informed by a large-scale member survey and guided by the Executive Advisory Roundtable (EAR). We'll also work to ensure the successful implementation of new programming, specifically SNAP Youth Justice (Probation) and Physically Secure services. Other priorities will include navigating and responding to changes to Chapter 984 of Florida Statute, improving NIRVANA fidelity and adherence to the SNAP® model and enhancing the statewide quality improvement system. Collectively, these efforts aim to boost accountability, improve service quality and strengthen partnerships with key partners across the state.



In addition, we want to ensure we are prepared for the challenges ahead. We know that many of the youth in our care present with significant mental health risks, including suicidal ideation. We are deeply concerned about the well-being of each and every young person we serve and are working diligently to ensure we are prepared to respond should a crisis occur.

These accomplishments, and our vision for future growth, would not be possible without the contributions of each and every agency professional, board member and teammate. We are sincerely grateful for your continued and thoughtful approach to caring for Florida's youth and families.

SERVICES

"Sheltering" Youth and Families in Crisis

Often youth and families in crisis need shelter from their troubles. When the challenges become overwhelming, the frequent results are child abuse, academic failure, domestic violence, homelessness and juvenile delinquency. The Florida Network is a statewide association of organizations which exist to prevent such disastrous results and to provide "shelter from the storm." These organizations are made up of caring professionals who provide numerous services such as community outreach, emergency triage and assessment, crisis shelter and family counseling.

CINS/FINS: Children and Families in Need of Services

Residential Services:

Florida Network Shelters offer crisis intervention for families and a safe place to stay for youth that is open 24 hours a day, 7 days a week, every day of the year. We work with families to reunify through counseling services offered by clinical professionals, a therapeutic environment and coordination with local partners.

Counseling and Case Management:

Network members provide community-based outpatient counseling services to youth and families who are experiencing conflict and instability in the home. This early intervention helps to facilitate communication between the youth and their parents or guardians, to deter destructive behavior before it's too late.

CINS/FINS counseling programs are provided in communities where some of Florida's most marginalized youth and families live. Individual, family and group sessions are available to young people, parents and guardians, free of charge. Programs utilize evidence-based approaches like cognitive behavioral therapy and trauma-informed care to help youth and families survive crisis and thrive beyond it.

Juvenile Justice Respite Programs

Domestic Violence Respite:

This program serves as an alternative to secure detention for youth who are arrested and charged with a Domestic Violence Offense on a household member. The Network Office coordinates statewide oversight, assistance and training to the member agencies to better support this population of youth.

Probation Respite:

This program provides a respite to youth who are at-risk of violating their probation. Through the services offered at our member agencies with this intervention, youth are encouraged to make positive choices.


Family Youth Respite Aftercare (FYRAC)*: Family Youth Respite Aftercare (FYRAC) Services are designed to serve youth and their families in the community setting who have been referred by the Department of Juvenile Justice and arrested for a Domestic Violence (DV) offense on a household member. Youth who are on probation, regardless of adjudication status are eligible as well. The goal of this program is to work with the youth and family to address the pattern of behavior that has led the youth to make unhealthy decisions that resulted in a delinquency referral.

Stop Now and Plan - SNAP® (under 12)

The gender-specific SNAP® programs are designed for children ages 6-11 who have difficulty with emotional regulation and self-control and are engaging in disruptive behavior such as aggression, rule-breaking, bullying, or trouble with authority figures. Experienced and highly-trained staff work with each family to assess challenges and problems and develop an action plan.

Boys and girls and their caregivers attend gender specific weekly group sessions for 13 weeks. The primary goal of SNAP® is to help children to stop and think before they act and empower them for improved family relationships,



positive social interactions and success in school. Free childcare for siblings and a meal are provided each week. A variety of topics are addressed such as managing angry thoughts and feelings, learning self control and problem solving.

SNAP® in Schools and Communities

SNAP® in Schools and Communities is based on the Stop Now and Plan (SNAP®) Program and is delivered to students ages 6-11, focusing on developing SNAP® skills to promote a positive change in behavior. The 13- week, in-class program covers topics such as managing anger, handling group/ peer pressure and dealing with bullying. The program also offers classroom interventions for all students who will benefit from the universal skills learned in the SNAP® classroom and other community setting sessions.

SNAP® for Youth

SNAP for Youth is a newly developed model that expands services to youth aged 12 - 17. This new SNAP program utilizes technology to build on the existing model's solid evidence-based foundations and practices to engage high-risk participants. SNAP for Youth facilitators lead youth through a 13-week program that involves discussions, modeling, behavioral rehearsal/ role-playing, practice exercises, and relaxation training using youth and facilitator tablets in digitally-based intervention modules. These modules provide real-life scenarios designed to improve self control and decision making.

SNAP® Fatherhood

SNAP® Fatherhood Initiative is a statewide program coupling Case Management services with a research-based cognitive behavioral group model known as SNAP® (Stop Now and Plan). This program is specifically designed to empower fathers to foster their unique role in their children's lives. Fathers can have assistance to find resources while also engaging in thirteen (13) weeks of

curriculum to enhance learning, growing, and improving their relationships and bonds specific to fathers with their children. This program is funded by the Department of Children and Families (DCF) and is partnering with communities to support fathers needs in employment, transitioning back into parenting, managing child support obligations, understanding child development, and enhancing parenting skills.

Intensive Case Management**

Intensive Case Management provides long term (6-9 months) support to families in need who have youth that are chronically truant and or runaway. Families are referred for services through a court order or case staffing within their circuit. Case managers work closely with the family on a weekly basis to provide support and implement solutions using a strength based approach.

Shareet Cares Project

The Shareet Cares Project prevents and interrupts homelessness through Flexible Cash Assistance and Individualized Case Planning. Eligible clients ages 6-21 received the NIRVANA assessment, support, and referrals from partner agencies, Lutheran Services of Florida and the Florida Housing Coalition. Guided by a Youth Action Board of young people with lived experience, and a multi-disciplinary task force of community stakeholders, the Shareet Cares Project serves Broward, Palm Beach, Dade, Collier, Lee, Glades, Hendry, and Charlotte Counties.

PROGRAM TRAINING & EVENTS

This year, the Florida Network made significant developments and accomplishments in our program training and events department.

The year was marked by a delivery of meaningful and practical educational sessions, with topics focusing on counseling, lock out protocols, incident reporting, safety, suicide prevention, truancy, trend analysis reports, and more. We continued our collaboration with internal and external partners and enriched our training programs with valuable feedback and contributions from our learners. **Our learning management system offered dynamic training events, courses, and emerging learning opportunities for over 1800 learners, which includes staff, interns, and volunteers.**



Key Achievement #1

CERTIFICATION TRAININGS

- **Certified Peer Reviewers:** We certified **44 new Peer Reviewers** to our team, fortifying our dedication to quality reviews, analyzing trends, and leading best practices in our programs.
- **Managing Aggressive Behavior:** We certified **16 trainers** in the University of Oklahoma's National Resource Center for Youth Services (NRCYS) Managing Aggressive Behavior (MAB) model. Trainers deliver this curriculum for newly hired staff and refresher in-service sessions to prepare staff in cultivating a safe environment and managing crisis situations in a supportive, compassionate, and trauma-responsive manner.
- **Motivational Interviewing (MI):** We re-certified our MI trainers, and added a new trainer, to deliver the Department and Juvenile Justice's revised one-day model, where trainings are delivered virtually, as well as in-person throughout the state. We now offer this training monthly to all staff and especially those who will facilitate the NIRVANA Assessment.

Key Achievement #3

INSTRUCTOR-LED TRAININGS

Throughout the year, our team delivered over **657 hours of in-person and virtual instructor-led trainings**. These sessions center on staff performance and development support geared towards strategic and result-focused topics for direct-care staff, nurses, clinicians, support personnel, interns, volunteers, and executives. **The SNAP® team expanded with three new program coordinators, who have contributed toward modeling and strengthening the SNAP® model across the state, where 166 new SNAP® Facilitators** were trained, for eleven hosted trainings. The SNAP® team welcomed nearly 50 attendees during the annual SNAP® Lead event, in Orlando, FL.

THROUGHOUT THE YEAR, **the Florida Network brought together leaders, stakeholders, and partners** from across the state through key convenings designed to strengthen collaboration, leadership, and shared impact, including the Annual SNAP® LEAD Event highlighting the mission of our SNAP® programming; the Annual Meeting celebrating award recipients and accomplishments from the previous year; the Fall Board of Directors Retreat; Hill Day at the Capitol; the Spring virtual Quality Improvement Community (QIC) convening; the Spring Board of Directors meeting; and the return of the Shelter Lead convening—reinforcing statewide alignment and a collective commitment to improving outcomes for children, youth and families.

SHAREET CARES PROJECT

About the Shareet Cares Project

Named in honor of our late colleague, Shareet Pennino, this federally funded project explores a new approach to preventing, and ending, youth homelessness in south Florida. The Florida Network proudly partners with the Florida Housing Coalition and Lutheran Services Florida to lead our clients to sustainable housing, and learn the skills to maintain it.

Who We Serve

We assist children and young people ages 6-21 who are homeless, or at risk of becoming homeless, in Florida counties: Broward, Palm Beach, Miami-Dade, Lee, Collier, Charlotte, Hendry, and Glades.

How We Work

The project is guided by a task force of private and public partners, as well as a Youth Action Board made up of young people (ages 18-25) who have experienced homelessness, the juvenile justice, or child welfare systems. Their guidance makes the project relevant and effective.

Our Prevention Approach

Our definition of “prevention” was shaped by our partners and Youth Action Board. We focus on preventing homelessness by addressing the root causes and offering resources. Key components include:

Education: Teaching about housing rights, available resources, and ways to maintain stable housing.

System Navigation: Helping people access services and overcome barriers.

Financial Literacy: Offering budgeting and financial stability training to prevent housing issues.

Empowerment: Giving individuals the tools and confidence to advocate for themselves and navigate housing challenges.

Understanding Leases: Understanding tenant rights and responsibilities to prevent eviction.

Community Connections: Building strong community support systems to reduce isolation.

Improving Quality of Life: Addressing mental health, substance abuse, and other challenges that impact housing stability.

Relationships: Strengthening support networks, including peer and community partnerships, to build resilience.

Our Services


We provide services including:

- The NIRVANA assessment to identify risk factors
- Personalized case planning
- Flexible cash assistance (direct payments for housing-related needs)
- Financial literacy training
- Follow-up support and re-assessment

Since May 2024, we've helped more than **300 clients** with Flexible Cash Assistance, and hundreds more through case management.

The Florida Network's **Fathers Advancing Towards Healthy and Effective Relationships (F.A.T.H.E.R.)** program is a statewide initiative coupling Case Management services with a research-based cognitive behavioral group model known as SNAP® (Stop Now and Plan). Funded by the Department of Children and Families (DCF), we partner with six agencies across eight (8) counties, including Bay, Clay, Duval, Seminole, Pinellas, Lee, Charlotte, and Broward. This program empowers Fathers to foster their unique role in their children's lives through services that provide effective parenting strategies and connect them directly to local resources and supports.

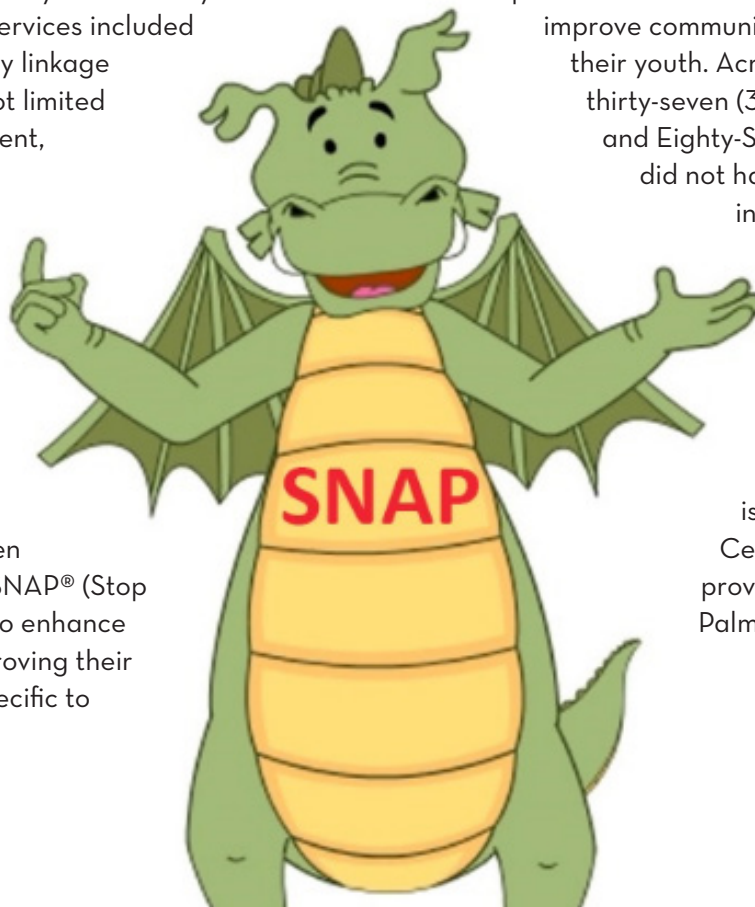
All eligible Fathers receive Case Management services that begin with a needs assessment exploring their circumstances to develop a client-specific support plan. This includes setting goals, connecting with internal services, and providing relevant external community resources (mental health and substance use, employment and education, co-parenting and visitation, transportation and child care, homelessness prevention, etc.). This service aims to create a circle of care that wraps its arms around our Fathers, enhancing system navigation while building safety and stability. Some Case Management services included assessments and community linkage to services including, but not limited to: mental health, employment, transportation, child-care, homeless prevention and assistance as well as basic needs being met such as food and security.

Fathers with children aged 6 - 12 are also eligible to engage in thirteen (13) week evidence-based SNAP® (Stop Now and Plan) curriculum to enhance learning, growing, and improving their relationships and bonds specific to

fathers with their children. Parents and their children participate in distinct groups with peers to learn the SNAP® strategy and other practical tools to improve emotional regulation and decision-making while decreasing reactive responses to conflict.

The Florida Network's overarching goal is to enhance the relationships between Florida's fathers, increase child and family stability and well-being, and halt the intergenerational transmission of adverse childhood experiences, child welfare, and justice system involvement. Father's can render services at these six (6) partner agencies: Anchorage Children's Home, Family Resources, Lutheran Services of FL (SW), Seminole County Sheriff's Office, Prevention Central, as well as Youth Crisis Center (YCC). During the Fiscal Year 2024-2025 (July 1, 2024 - June 30, 2025), the agencies have provided services to two hundred and twelve (212) Fathers in these service areas. This is a 207% increase than the year prior. This includes one hundred and forty-two (142) Fathers receiving specific Case Management Services and eighty-six (86) families have participated in SNAP® Programing. The curriculum has been utilized to improve knowledge of new parenting skills, increase positive involvement within the family, and

improve communication among parents and their youth. Across the six sites, there were thirty-seven (37) group cycles with Fathers and Eighty-Seven (87%) of these fathers did not have any other justice system involvement. Additionally, in the next fiscal year (July 1, 2025- June 30, 2026), Florida Network's Fathers Advancing Towards Healthy and Effective Relationships (F.A.T.H.E.R.) program is excited to partner with Center Child Counselling with providing services to Fathers in Palm Beach County.

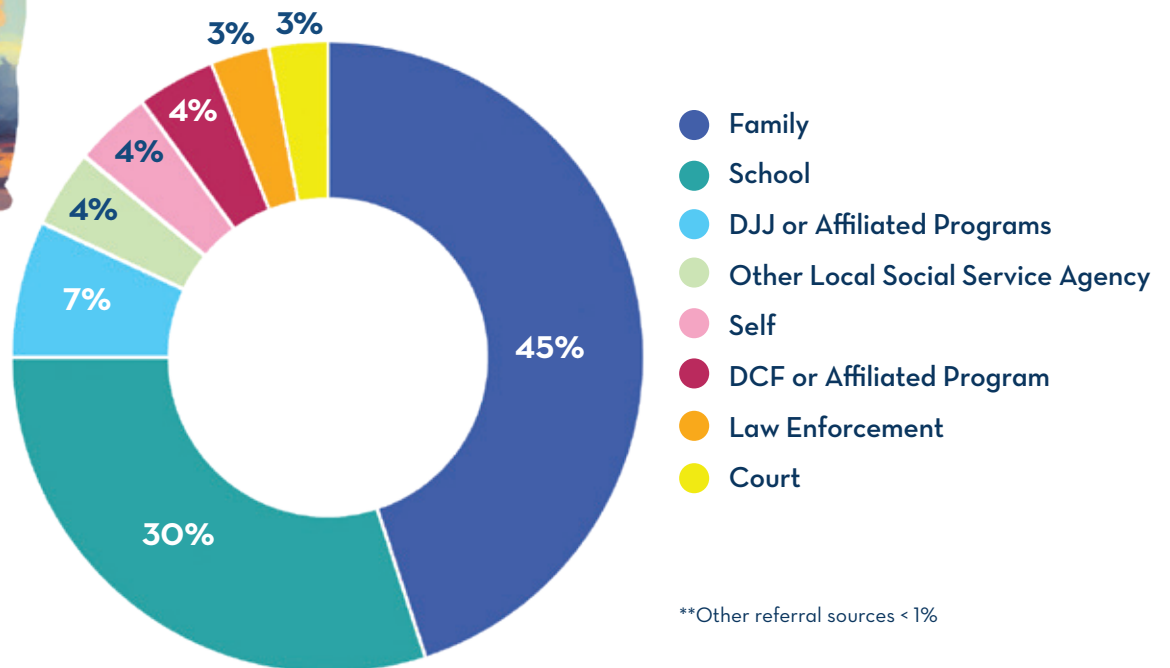

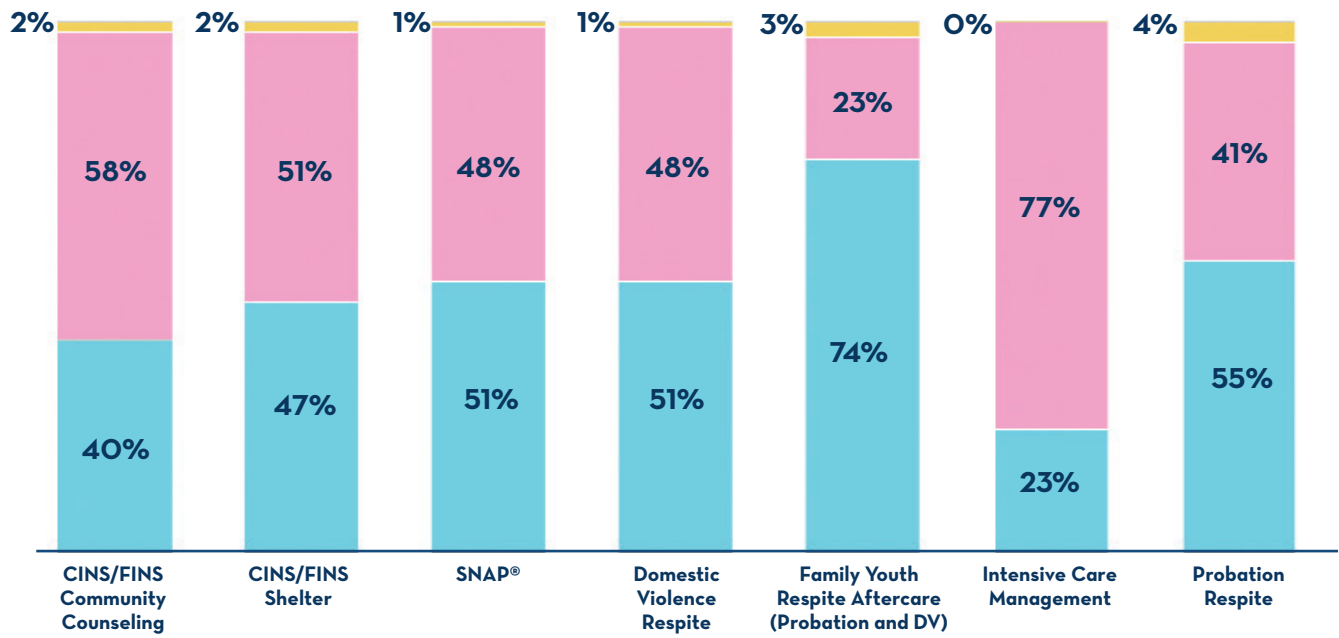

Race

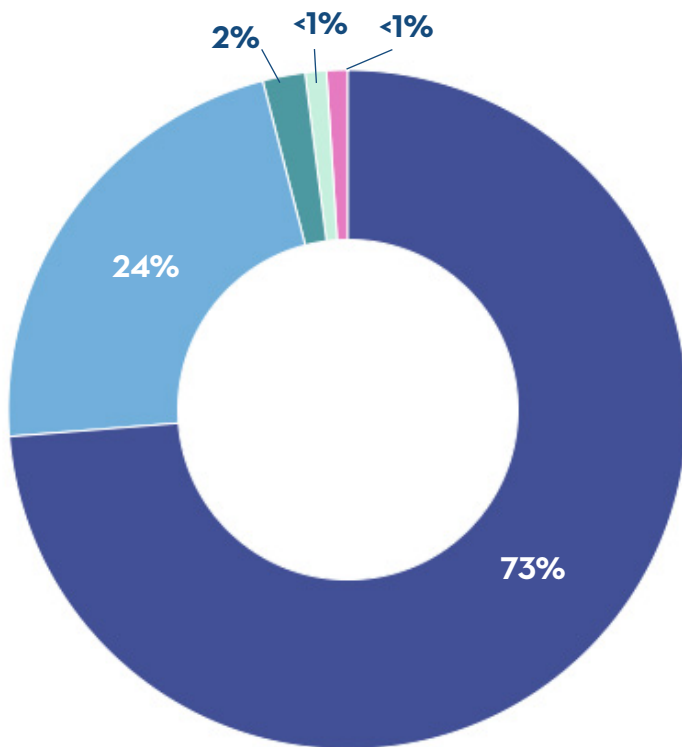
